1. ... ACCEPT SELF-RESPONSIBILITY , seeing themselves as primarily responsible for their own outcomes and experiences.	1. ...see themselves as victims, believing that what happens to them is determined primarily by external forces such as fate, luck, and powerful others.

3. ... MASTER SELF-MANAGEMENT , consistently planning and taking purposeful actions in pursuit of their goals and dreams.	3. ...seldom identify specific actions needed to accomplish a desired outcome. And when they do, they tend to procrastinate.
4. ... EMPLOY INTERDEPENDENCE , building mutually supportive relationships that help them achieve their goals and dreams (while helping others to do the same).	4. ...are solitary, seldom requesting and even rejecting offers of assistance from those who could help.
5. ... GAIN SELF-AWARENESS , consciously employing behaviors, beliefs, and attitudes that keep them on track.	5. ...make important choices unconsciously, being directed by self-sabotaging habits and outdated life scripts.
6. ... ADOPT LIFE-LONG LEARNING , finding valuable lessons and wisdom in nearly every experience.	6. ...resist learning new ideas and skills, viewing learning as fearful or boring rather than as mental play.
7. ... DEVELOP EMOTIONAL INTELLIGENCE , effectively managing their emotions in support of their goals and dreams.	7. ...live at the mercy of strong emotions such as anger, depression, anxiety, or a need for instant gratification.
