graded take-home assignments and 50% on regular listening/speaking tests. This gives you a class-work grade percentage. Then at the end of the semester I take this class-work percentage and factor in the final-exam grade at 20% of the classwork to give you a final semester grade. Even if my grades show +/-, at this point Admissions and Records will still record your grade without +/-. Students are expected to take all tests with the class. Please talk to me in class or let me know by telephone or email if you must miss a scheduled test so that a makeup can be arranged. Missing tests without notifying the teacher results in a grade of 0 for the exam. Late work will not be accepted after the due date for the next in that category. There is no extra credit for this class.

Final Exam: The final exam for this class is on a special time and day: Friday May 29, 8:10-10:40. Plan ahead for this time.

Catalogue Course Description: Course Description: Three units of credit (3 lecture hours per week). Development of listening comprehension and oral proficiency of standard spoken English at the pre-intermediate level. Listening focuses on comprehension of modified spoken English, vocabulary in context, and ideas in speeches and discussions. Speaking focuses on clear pronunciation of common words and phrases, continued development of fluency in conversation, and proficiency in initiating, sustaining, and ending oral communication in a variety of contexts.

Detailed Course Description: At Skyline we want our students to graduate with AA/AS degrees, qualify for work certificates, and to transfer to four-year universities. Our ESOL students often come back to tell us about their successes after taking English classes at Skyline.

After a year of work and study in the US, most students acquire a vocabulary of the most common 2700 words of written and spoken English, plus extra specialty words for work, childcare, or hobbies. These 2700 words are all a person needs for basic shopping, going to the bank, and many entry-level jobs. The reason to take this class is to work on developing clear spoken fluency in the vocabulary you already have, but to also increase that vocabulary into the most common 6000 words of English that you will read, write, speak, and hear in college.

To increase you confidence and spoken fluency and clarity, I have ordered the Kehe *Conversation Strategies* book. You will already know most of the vocabulary, so it is easier to focus on the ways to use this vocabulary to solve group problems and increase your conversation fluency.

To increase your academic listening and speaking vocabulary, we will work through the Brooks *Q: Skills for Success* book. This book comes with an online practice access code that will give you many listening opportunities. This is what will push your vocabulary into the 6000 words that you need to discuss the lively topics in *Q-Skills for Success*. But you cannot just speak in one-word sentences, so *Q-Skills* includes a grammar focus in each chapter, and very often I will ask you to show your developing grammar skills in writing.

When former students come back to see me, one thing I always notice is that their pronunciation and spoken fluency had gotten better. These skills get better with practice, maybe even more out of class than in. One hour three days a week is not enough to show much improvement. So your job is to do everything you can to look for opportunities for new ways to use your English for new experiences. Skyline is a goldmine for new opportunities, so take other classes where you will meet people and learn new skills or perhaps practice your old skills in new ways. In other words, take a yoga class and even if you are very good at chemistry in your native language, take a low-level chemistry class for the vocabulary and work with a lab partner.

Here are some other tips professor Shaw gives her students:

About American Professors:

Do you want to be a successful student? Here are some tips:

- 1. Learn your professor's name, and call him/her by the correct name.
- 2. Visit your professor regularly. In U.S. colleges, students communicate regularly with their professors by email or coming to the professor's office hours (see top of page 1).
- **3. Come to class on time.** American professors value time. Being late is disrespectful.
- **4. Ask questions.** American professors expect you to ask questions when you do not understand. If you cannot ask in class, visit the professor in his/her office hours.

- 5. Call/email when you will be absent/late. American professors do not like to reschedule their time to accommodate a test or assignment. Show respect for the professor by letting him/her know you will be absent or late.
- 6. Use proper methods when sending an email. See below:
