Jump Start program nurtures success in the class of 2008

Leslie Shelton prepared this wonderful description of this summer's Jump Start group:

The heavy fog rolling across campus on Thursday evening, July 24th, did not dampen the spirits of the twenty-seven rambunctious high school juniors and seniors who gathered with their families and a wonderful team of Skyline College faculty to celebrate the conclusion of the 11th Jump Start summer program. Both joy and sadness filled the air as these “unlikely” college students marked a kind of success that few had experienced recently in their high school classes and said goodbye to newfound friends. Along the span of their intensive 6 week journey at Skyline, many were challenged to show up consistently, learn new math and English skills, develop their video expertise, and discover the inner and outer supports available for college success. Few expected to like the experience or see college as a real option in the future. Most just came just to get a bunch of valuable high school credits and gain the possibility of graduating on time. But the Skyline faculty worked its magic, as demonstrated in the students' own words.

Now that I joined Jump Start I feel like my life has turned around. My experience was unbelievable because I didn't think there was a program that could motivate me to do work and want to stay in class. Most importantly, the teachers were actually teaching me something. Marion

The evening was filled with examples of the students' creations. Awards of Excellence were given to a selected few outstanding students in math, English, video and college success. The celebration culminated with the presentation of the Outstanding Scholar Award exemplifying excellence in all four academic categories. As his stunned family sat in the audience Damion Concepcion, an Oceana High student, was announced as the unanimous winner nominated by all faculty members. Damion's summed up his experience this way:

What I liked most out of this experience was learning a lot of different things about school, but also about myself. I learned that I underestimate myself all the time when it comes to school, but when I came here, that all changed... This experience has changed me by teaching me that I can do anything if I just put my mind to it. No matter what the situation, work, or problem, I can solve it.

This is the magic of Jump Start – newly realized potential and renewed hope.
